Innovation in Immunization Practices Incentive Grant

The APhA Foundation established the Immunization Fund to support our mission in advancing the pharmacists' role in improving our nation's health. The Immunization Incentive Grants are supported through the APhA Foundation Immunization Fund and a Cooperative Agreement with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). These grants allow practitioners and student pharmacists to explore innovations specifically designed to improve immunization-related practices and engagement within immunization neighborhoods.



INCENTIVE GRANT IMPACT UPDATE

Since it's inception 25 years ago, your contributions and the support of the Community Pharmacy Foundation have sustained the APhA Foundation's Incentive Grants Program. You help invest in future leaders to pave the way for further innovation. The Incentive Grants awarded to pharmacy students and residents provide seed money to initiate or support existing innovative patient care services within their pharmacy practice areas.

Over the years, Incentive Grants show the role of the pharmacist as a key member of the healthcare team, testing new pharmacy practice models.

Lauren Kovel, PharmD, AAHIVP 2017 INCENTIVE GRANT RECIPIENT

Project: Physician and Pharmacist Perception of Barriers to Collaborative Drug Therapy Moni-toring Services in

Missour

Lauren is currently in the process of submitting her research for publication. While not adding additional research at this time, the study has impacted her clinical abilities.

"Understanding general feelings towards collaborative practice allowed my conversations with a local infectious disease physician to be frank and develop a relationship quickly. We are discussing a potential protocol for pharmacist-provided pre-exposure prophylaxis for HIV services to help uninsured or underinsured patients receive access to care. This physician is now a huge advocate for pharmacist-physician collaboration and has expressed interest in helping to further her research in the area of provider status for pharmacists."



Alexander Brewer, PharmD, MBA 2017 INCENTIVE GRANT RECIPIENT

Project: Patient Awareness, Willingness, and Barriers to Point-of-Care Hepatitis C Screening in Community Pharmacy

Alexander's research introduced new and significant data about patient awareness, willingness, and barriers to point-of-care Hepatitis C screening in community pharmacies. The Discoveries Patients trust the competency of their pharmacist and the confidentiality of a pharmacy setting. Nearly 3/4 of the patients responding to the study were willing to receive the point-of-care test at a community pharmacy.



Cody Clifton, PharmD 2017 INCENTIVE GRANT RECIPIENT

Project: Retrospective Analysis of the Financial Value of Patients Enrolled in a Medication Adherence Program at an Independent Community Pharmacy

Cody's research delivered a comprehensive retrospective financial analysis of patients enrolled in a medication adherence program at an independent community pharmacy. The Discoveries Eligible patients enrolled in a medication adherence program may increase gross profit as the number of prescriptions filled increases. Community pharmacies, particularly CPESN pharmacies, can increase the number of chronic medication fills and gross profit by managing complex patients in an adherence program with the utilization of adherence packaging. Increasing the provision of enhanced services, such as immunizations, increases profit for community pharmacies.



Cynthia Boyle, PharmD, FAPhA PAST INCENTIVE GRANT RECIPIENT

Project: Development of Pharmacy Student's Leadership and Advocacy Competence

Cynthia created an enduring tool from her project, parlaying her Incentive Grant research into the book, "Leadership and Advocacy for Pharmacy." This resource is used in teaching Doctor of Pharmacy courses to prepare students to be citizens and to encourage them to advocate for patients and the pharmacy profession.

Today, Boyle mentors colleagues, students, and others by helping them find a professional home where they can effect change at all levels of health care. She is honored to belong to a community of hard workers who are solving problems through – as she states in her book – the collegial efforts of pharmacists, student pharmacists, allies and legislators.

Research and Innovations Updates

Project IMPACT: Immunizations

In September, Project IMPACT: Immunizations received global recognition winning the International Pharmaceutical Federation (FIP) Pharmacy Practice Improvement Award.


The award was presented at FIP's World Congress of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences 2018 conference in Glasgow, Scotland. The Pharmacy Practice Improvement Program Award honors a program developed and run during the previous year that aims to improve or expand pharmacy practice and innovatively envision the pharmacist's role.

The American Pharmacists Association (APhA) Foundation initiated the pilot program, **Project IMPACT Immunizations** - an initiative where pharmacists use innovative, two-way information sharing technology known as IIS (immunization information systems) to access registry data that forecast which vaccinations a patient might need. Having access to a patient's vaccination history at the pointof-care allows the pharmacist to knowingly administer additional, recommended vaccines – within their scope of practice – and immediately update the patient's vaccine record into IIS, which is available to all members of the professional health care team who subscribe to the system.

The Project IMPACT: Immunizations initiative has been supported with funding from multiple sources that include: Merck & Co., Sanofi, VaxServe, and the APhA Foundation.



21st Annual Pinnacle Awards

The APhA Foundation celebrated innovative contributions to health care quality through the medication use process at its 21st Annual Pinnacle Awards Program. The three award recipients, CAPT Lisa Tonrey, Balls Food Stores, and the Bureau of Prisons Pharmacy Programs were honored for their achievements as an individual, corporation, and government agency, respectively. Their efforts provide and promote excellence in medication use and lead to safer and improved health outcomes for patients.

Capping off the celebration was the APhA Foundation's 2018 Pinnacle Awards Innovation in Pharmacy Lecture presented by CAPT Lisa Tonrey on the topic "Innovative Roles for the Pharmacist in Improving Population Health." he Jacob W. The 2018 award was presented to Patricia Mae Doykos, Director of the Bristol-Myers Squibb (BMS) Foundation. Learning about APhA Foundation's work to address chronic conditions, Bristol-Myers Squibb Foundation (BMS) partnered with APhA Foundation to fund the expansion of Project IMPACT: Diabetes, to reach and treat those with diabetes who live in medically underserved communities across the country.

Dr. Doykos shared her views on the collaboration:

This innovative project clearly demonstrated the critical role that pharmacists play in bringing high-quality care and support to high-risk and vulnerable populations in communities across the country.



The Bowl of Hygeia Award Programs

Twice each year the APhA Foundation with our partner, NASPA, gathers together to celebrate the recent and past recipients of the Bowl of Hygeia Award - pharmacists across our nation who have distinguished themselves for establishing deep ties to their communities. During the 2018 APhA Annual Meeting in Nashville and during the 2018 NCPA Annual Convention in Boston, APhA Board members and NASPA leadership commended these pharmacists who demonstrate exemplary service to their communities, cultivating substantive connections over time. For more than 50 years this award has been presented to pharmacists in all 50 states, Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia. Boehringer Ingelheim was premier supporter of the Bowl of Hygeia Award Programs and has no input in the selection of the award recipients.


Shaping the Future

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
